'The Big Flood'

book launched to support recovery in Rochester

A powerful new book capturing the voices and experiences of the Rochester community following the devastating 2022 floods has officially launched.

Titled The Big Flood, the book was edited by renowned author and photographer, Kathy Mexted and stands as a testament to the strength, resilience, and unity of the community.

Funded through the Campaspe Shire Council Flood Recovery Program with support from State and Federal Government recovery funding, the project was communityled, with heartfelt contributions from local residents forming the backbone of the book's narrative. Through storytelling, reflection, and community voices, the book offers a space for acknowledgment, understanding, and hope.

The launch event, held at Rochester Shire Hall with retired local police officer John Atley acting as master of ceremonies, welcomed all members of the public to come together in recognition of the shared journey through recovery. Attendees were gifted a free copy of the book, and additional copies are now available at Rochester Community House.

Campaspe Shire Mayor Cr Daniel Mackrell congratulated the community on the launch of the book.

"The Big Flood is more than a record of events. It serves as a cathartic and healing resource, created to support emotional recovery and connection in the wake of the floods.

"This project exemplifies the power of community collaboration and storytelling in times of crisis. It is a tribute to the people of Rochester and a reminder of the importance of listening, sharing, and healing together," he said.

Escaped burn-offs prompt warning from CFA

CFA has urged landowners to be careful of burning off activities after a day of strong winds saw more than 40 grassfires burn across the state on Monday.

Landowners are also encouraged to keep checking their recent burn-offs up to 48 hours later

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said conditions lately have been exceptionally dangerous for burning off.

"Firefighters have responded to multiple escaped burn-offs today, many which have reignited from burn-offs over the weekend," Jason said on Monday.

"We're asking the community to be aware of your local conditions and stop burning off activities until safe to do so.

"We know burn-offs can flare-up several days afterwards, so it is important residents are consistently monitoring wind conditions before and after their burning day, while also notifying their neighbours to be mindful of smoke

"If you light a fire to burn-off, you own it. Please don't leave your burn-off unattended and always make sure it is extinguished properly with water.

"Victorians should be registering their burn-offs online through the Fire Permits Victoria website to help agencies manage fire risk effectively."

Before burning off, ensure:

- You are following regulations or laws by CFA and your local council.
- A fire break is established with no less than three metres cleared of all flammable material.
- You register your burn-off using the Fire Permits Victoria website or by calling Triple Zero Victoria on 1800 668 511.

Draft Domestic Animal Management Plan open for feedback

Campaspe Shire Council is currently reviewing its Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) for 2026–2029.

This plan sets out the main issues, goals, and priorities for managing cats and dogs within the local community. As required by the Domestic Animals Act 1994, a new plan must be developed every four years.

The Mayor of Campaspe Shire, Cr Daniel Mackrell, highlighted the significance of this plan for all residents, not just pet owners. With around 9,000 registered pets in the region, the Council recognises the valuable role domestic animals play in people's lives. The aim is to create a balanced approach that considers the needs of pet owners, animal welfare, and broader community expectations.

The plan addresses a range of topics related to responsible pet ownership. These include desexing, microchipping, managing dogs in public spaces, designated on- and off-leash areas, managing nuisance animals, barking complaints, cat confinement, and proper disposal of animal waste.

Input from the community has played a

key role in shaping the draft. Feedback from 190 survey responses revealed strong support for improving education on microchipping and registration requirements, simplifying the registration process, and offering guidance on how to deal with nuisance animals or dog attacks.

The draft plan is now available for public review and feedback through the Council's website under the Now Open section, with submissions open until 4pm on Friday, 3 October 2025.

Wetlands group tours historic Indigenous sites

Taungurung Land and Water Council's Corop Wetlands Cultural Landscape Project area of interest extends from Reedy Lakes in the south to the Corop Lakes in the north and takes in the Rushworth forest.

A tour group starting from Nagambie and led by Uncle Shane Monk and Ashley Wilkinson drove into Reedy Lakes reserve and looked at Aboriginal ovens (middens) and scar trees. Ash gave an explanation of the process of bark removal and showed the group a recent demonstration scar, and a number of ancient scars were viewed. The bed of the lake was almost dry, and the middens were dotted all over the ground where they had followed the receding water.

The bus then took the group to Whroo campground where a morning tea was served, including beef and kangaroo sausage rolls and a choice of herbal teas from local plants.

Uncle Shane and Ash then showed us their possum skin

cloaks, (skins now sustainably sourced from New Zealand where they are an environmental pest after being introduced from Australia), and invited group members to try them on!

The tour bus then drove the group to the Aboriginal rock water hole near Whroo Cemetery. Uncle Shane explained that this was an important hydration point as the mob moved in dry times from the Corop Lakes area as they the water dried up, towards Reedy Lake and the Goulburn River.

The final stop was to look at grass trees, and Ash explained their importance in providing fire-starting materials, and the how resin from the flowers was used for making very strong glue for spear heads.

"The Waring (mid-Goulburn River) is defined by the many hundreds of wetlands, billabongs and lagoons that spread across its flood plain. These have formed over many thousands of years, as the living river has changed course over time, leaving depressions that fill with water when the river floods in the high flows that come in winter and spring. This water brings life to the wetlands, which provide nursery grounds for fish and rich nesting and feeding places for countless water birds. The wetlands are also the lungs and kidneys of Waring, helping slow and filter flood waters, and retaining water in the landscape to support all life Taungurung Land and Waters Council has led the development of a Corop Cultural Waterscape program, which is looking at how the Corop wetlands can be cared for in a holistic way that takes into account cultural knowledge and values, while collaborating closely with government agencies and the wider community. This program has now been launched, with support from the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action and other government departments and agencies. A key aspect of this program will be to find solutions to complex land and water management challenges by working closely together with present day local communities to understand their needs and perspectives, and will provide many opportunities to connect to the practical work of caring for Country at important places within the waterscape."


This free event will be held on Wednesday, 29 October at Tongala Shire Hall in Mangan St, from 10am to 2pm.



Welcome grants

In recent weeks, Rushworth Community House has been the recipient of two significant grants to aid its service delivery.

Some time ago, the Federal Member for Nicholls, Sam Birrell, MP, nominated Rushworth Community House for a \$3,000 grant to support our volunteers and their wide range of activities.

RCH staff were recently advised that the House was successful in its application for the 2024-25 Volunteer Grants Program.

Rushworth Community House extends its sincere gratitude to Mr Birrell for his help.

Shire Community Grant

Campaspe Shire recently approved a 2024/2025 Community Grant of \$3,146 to Rushworth Community House to acquire new and upgraded service delivery equipment.

Items purchased for RCH community support activities include a barista coffee machine, a microwave oven and refrigerator for our multipurpose room (MPR), and a water-efficient, dual-drawer dishwasher for the House's commercial kitchen.

The coffee machine has already undergone its baptism of fire at the hands of students from Rushworth P-12 College during a recent community-wide morning tea.

The new microwave and fridge in the MPR room will be especially welcomed by the House's Quilting Group, and other groups and individuals who utilise the room.

Community members are invited to call into the House to "check out" the new additions.

Another great Women's Health Night



Rushworth Community House recently partnered with Goulburn Valley Health Waranga Campus to present another Women's Health Night, held in the House's multipurpose room. More than thirty people attended the event.

The event's first guest speaker was Ms Rebecca East who is a Nurse Practitioner with The Holistic Care Collective.

Ms East's theme was "Why proactive care matters - tracking and monitoring your health" and she canvassed practical ways in which women - and men - can maintain and even improve their health.

Checkups for all

She discussed booking annual check ups that include assessing blood pressure and sugar level, cholesterol, BMI, skin, breast, prostate checks, cervical, bowels, bone density, understanding family health concerns and genetic pre-disposition.

Ms East then went on to talk about daily habits to support your body and mind – movement, nutrition, rest, mental health.

"Empowered aging starts today - don't wait for symptoms; have regular check-ups and health assessments; book appointments in advance; encourage your friends and family; start with small daily habits.

"Start with one action this week – book a check-up, go for a walk, check your BP! If you are not sure; book your appointment as you're not bothering your health profession."

Menopausal matters

The evening's next speaker was Dr Margreet Stegeman, an obstetrician and gynaecologist, from Shepparton Women's Health Centre, who spoke about menopause.

Dr Stegeman Margreet discussed the complex topic of perimenopausal symptoms, and how the average age for these to start is fifty one years.

A number of change occur at this stage, including depletion of egg numbers, fluctuations in hormone levels, decrease in oestrogen and progesterone, temperature control dysfunction, and narrowing of a person's thermoneutral zone leading to increased sensitivity to changes in core body temperature (feeling unusually hot or cold).

Many of those present on the night had experienced these changes, so the discussion was particularly relevant to them.

Dr Stegeman described how hot flushes, and night sweats are influenced by a number of factors, including:

- climate
- diet and obesity
- lifestyle
- limited physical activity and smoking
- · mood disorders
- depression and anxiety.

Dr Stegeman discussed the benefits and risks associated with Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT) and its role in treating some of the worst symptoms of menopause.

She also noted how changes to weight and lifestyle can reduce menopausal symptoms, while other non-hormonal treatments and alternative therapies can also prove beneficial.

Those who attended were all provided with gift packs with information on:

- heart health
- menopause, HRT and mind health
- cervical and lung cancer screening
- · bone and joint health
- nutrition and healthy eating
- calcium, vitamin D and other supplments
- · social connection
- information about Shepparton Women's Health Centre and its services.

The great team of Sandra and Guido Vazzoler, Jack Brady and Angie Russi created their second 'un pranzo degli artisti' - a lunch of the artists.


Tabled Together was held at Longleat Winery in Murchison last Sunday and was a real treat for the appreciative crowd.

The weather was perfect and the guests were welcomed with a glass of bubbles before enjoying their Italian inspired lunch in the La Zingara dining room.







Cooks Corner

A visitor's cornbread

Don't you love visitors that arrive bearing something they've baked for you to try?

I hadn't even met Erica, but she arrived at our door with a plate of her home-made cornbread. I had to admit that I knew nothing about cornbread, so after I'd taste tested it over a cup of tea, she wrote out her recipe

It was beautifully moist and we ate it just as it was, but could've spread it with a little butter. Erica said it's nice served warm, so we did give it a few seconds in the MW which was enough to melt the butter. Taste tested!

INGREDIENTS

3/4 cup polenta (not instant) 1¹/₂ cups plain flour 1 tbspn baking powder 1/2 cup sugar pinch of salt 1 cup creamed corn 125g melted butter 2 eggs 3/4 cup milk

METHOD

Combine all the dry ingredients and mix well. In another bowl, combine and mix all the wet ingredients then mix the wet and dry ingredients together.

Pour the mix into a pre-heated, greased pan and bake at about 190°C for 30 minutes or thereabouts until the top is nicely browned and a skewer inserted in the middle comes out clean.

Note: When I was Googling 'polenta', I found it could be used in numerous ways and I aim to try this next time I'm roasting potatoes. You par-boil the potatoes, drain them well, sprinkle polenta over them and give the pot a good shake. Bake them in a roasting pan with olive oil, some sprigs of Rosemary and a few garlic cloves.

Handy Hints - from Lyn Rumble

Hi there,

Repurposing or re-using everyday items - or quick and easy solutions to general household issues that maybe had not even occurred to you - is what I like to do. Of course saving a bit on the grocery bill always helps too!

This issue is garden focused, as now the days are getting slightly warmer, things (mostly weeds in my garden anyway) are growing rapidly, so I need to do some veggie and flower planting to control the spread. Hope you get some benefit from these tips this issue!

- * Now is the time to start seedlings or repot small plants for early spring **veggies and flowers** – a recycle way to do that is use your empty ice cream containers. Put some holes in the bottom with a hot steel knitting needle to make the drainage holes (Kids - get Mum or Dad to do that for you) and fill with good quality potting mix.
- * Clean shredded paper makes great mulch for strawberries and asparagus it's a win-win all around really, as the fruit stems are kept clean, the nasty crawlies and bugs hate the sharp edges of the torn paper, and the paper rots down as compost - what more could you ask of something that would get chucked away!
- * Got an old hot water bottle that cannot **hold water any longer?** – What to do with it? Put some loose sand inside and seal it, and use as a kneeling mat for when you are in the garden weeding or planting.
- * I'm always misplacing small garden tools - but if you paint the handle with some fluoro paint, it should stand out amongst the garden beds when you've left it behind - so problem solved!
- * Bees beautiful creatures they are - and they just love yellow and purple flowers. If you plant things like marigolds, violas, crocus, daffodil, tulips, wildflower mixes..... It will greatly increase your pollinating potential for your other garden varieties.

Free menstrual products available at **Council locations**

Campaspe Shire Council is participating in a Victorian Government initiative providing free menstrual products at public locations across the state, aiming to combat period poverty and improve access to essential hygiene products.

For many, menstrual products can be unaffordable, leading to negative impacts on health, education, employment, and social participation. This statewide rollout follows a successful pilot and will see 1,500 vending machines installed at up to 700 sites, including hospitals, TAFEs, libraries, train stations, and more.

In Campaspe Shire, machines have been installed at customer service centres in Rochester, Rushworth, and Tongala, as well as the Echuca Library. Due to space limitations, Kyabram's centre is currently on hold.

vending machines are maintenance, requiring no mains power, and are monitored remotely via Wi-Fi for battery life and stock levels. Refills are managed by the provider.

Echuca Library's Jenny Mustey, leading the project locally, said:

"This simple but impactful measure can prevent missed school, work, or social opportunities, making public spaces more inclusive and supportive for all.'

Be asthma-ready this spring

The arrival of spring means warmer weather and more time outdoors, but for many Victorians, it also brings an increased risk of asthma.

Ambulance Victoria is reminding the community to review and update their asthma action plans as spring approaches—a season known to trigger asthma symptoms and flare-

Asthma affects individuals across all age groups, and while it can be life-threatening in severe cases, it is generally manageable with a personalised action plan developed in consultation with a healthcare professional. These plans are essential for avoiding emergency situations and maintaining control over the condition.

Common asthma triggers during spring include outdoor allergens such as pollen, dust, and air pollution, as well as weather-related events like thunderstorms. Indoor irritantssuch as mould, dust mites, and emissions from gas appliances—can also contribute to symptoms.

People with asthma are advised to watch for signs such as wheezing, shortness of breath, chest tightness, and persistent coughing. Even if symptoms have subsided

over time, asthma does not simply go away, which is why it's important to keep action plans current.

Medical experts recommend that adults update their asthma plans at least once a year. For children, a review every six months is advised. It's also important to note that asthma can develop later in life; persistent hay fever or allergy symptoms such as a runny nose and itchy eyes may indicate the onset of asthma, and should be discussed with a GP.

Taking proactive steps to manage asthma not only reduces the risk of serious flare-ups but also helps ease the demand on emergency services. Those experiencing difficulty breathing that does not improve with reliever medication should call Triple Zero (000) immediately.

For non-emergency concerns, Victorians have access to various urgent care options, including the Victorian Virtual Emergency Department (VVED). This online service connects users with emergency doctors and nurses via video telehealth, available from anywhere in the state, 24/7. The platform can be accessed at www.vved.org.au from any internet-connected device with a camera.

Visiting an Urgent Care Clinic is also at option or visiting a GP or pharmacist who can provide timely non-urgent care.

Calling Nurse-On-Call, which offers free medical advice 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The number for Nurse-On-Call is 1300 60 60

All about wildlife

Kirsty Ramadan from BoHollow Wildlife is a wildlife rescue expert. Here she shares some of her knowledge about our very familiar wildlife neighbours.

Snakes Alive! (And it's important that they are)

The babes have begun to arrive at the shelter. Ducklings, plover chicks and the first magpie nestling have already required our assistance and care.

Other native critters that are making an appearance are our reptiles. Snakes and lizards are becoming more and more active as the warmth of the changing seasons becomes obvious. This time of year, our reptile friends are usually still not far from the shelter of their winter hiding spots. They are slower as being ectotherms, they rely solely on the ambient temperature around them and external heat sources such as the sun to bring them to active temperatures.

If you are worried about snakes around your property, there are things you can do to minimise the risk to your pets or people around your yard.

The most efficient way to deter our native snakes is to snake proof your yard or even a section of yard. Vermin proof mesh is hard, fine gauge, small holed mesh and is the only material safe to erect around the bottom of fencelines, gates and yards. Snakes will and do fit through chicken wire, even the small stuff and there is also a high risk of a snake getting stuck in chicken wire.

Soft, fruit tree netting, also called 'snake netting' is damaging to all types of our native creatures, not just snakes, as they get tangled and stuck in it. Netting causes horrific injury, pain and suffering to our natives and we attend entanglement cases of both reptiles, birds and



mammals who fall victim to this horrible stuff each year. This netting is illegal, for very good reason. Please, do not use it.

Snakes need places to shelter and hide. If you do not wish to have a resident snake in your yard, eliminating piles of debris and rubbish helps.

If you love your rambling garden and have provided a welcoming habitat for snakes to live on your property, there are other simple things you can do to make things a little more snake safe. Keep paths and high human traffic areas clean and mowed short. This way you will be more likely to see a snake before you get to it. It's usually when a person does not realise they've got too close to a venomous snake without realising or they are attempting to kill it, when a snake is more likely to deliver a bite possessing venom.

The scent of introduced rodents attracts snakes so if you have a rodent problem in your house or sheds, you can almost guarantee a snake will eventually appear. We recommend the old snap traps, electric traps or live capture traps to control introduced rodents as baits are lethal for all of our native species who feed on poisoned rodents.

Snake safety in our Australian environment is something every Australian should know as these animals are a critical member of a healthy ecosystem. Not only are they a top end predator but they are also a valuable food source for other critters such as birds and other reptiles.

Every household should have a snake bite bandage handy in both their first aid kit and also their vehicle, particularly if you're a bush walker as I am. Scrub up on your first aid response for snake bite, there are plenty of resources online where you can refresh your knowledge on this. If you follow medical recommendations, if you do manage to be unlucky and cop a bite, you should survive and have

plenty of time to get to hospital for treatment. Not many people die of snake bite in Australia due to our excellent antivenoms. You do not need to know what type of snake bit you now to receive the appropriate treatment.

Things you can do if you are faced with a snake in close proximity to minimise getting bitten are pretty straight forward.

Snakes move around their environment using smell and eyesight. They are extremely reactive to movement. If you are too close and a snake has realised you are there and they cannot escape, they will flatten their head and neck and raise their head off the ground. If the threat continues, they will stand right up, in what most people refer to as strike position. This is to warn us that the snake feels threatened and is prepared to attempt to defend itself. If the threat continues, a snake may throw itself towards you in a mock strike, not actually intending to deliver a bite but a further warning to move away. I'm sure everyone has heard someone they know say a snake 'chased' them. This act of moving towards a threat and mock strike behaviour is all defensive behaviour. A snake has no desire to actively hunt you out and chase you, but it will attempt to drive you away if other defensive tactics are not working.

The simple act of moving away from a snake is usually enough for the snake to take the opportunity to disappear into the surrounding environment without any more fuss. Snakes do not wish to engage with us just as much as we do not wish to engage with them. We are a predator in their eyes which they wish to stay clear of.

If you cannot freely and safely move away, if you stay still and do not move, the snake will perceive the threat gone and continue on its way.

If a snake is sitting in a place that's not ideal, a soft broom is



a great tool to use between you and the snake, the movement of a broom is usually enough to persuade it to move to a safer spot without getting close.

If you are walking or working in an area with lots of cover, habitat or a possible snake area, be vigilant, wear appropriate footwear and be mindful of your hands reaching into places you cannot see and lifting things off the ground which may have a snake resting underneath.

If you do not wish to share your space with a snake and you wish for it to be removed, do not kill it, call a snake catcher.

Killing a snake is not a hero move or necessary and is in truth, the senseless killing of a justifiably protected native species.

Remember, snakes do not wish to hurt us or our pets unless they feel their life is in danger.

Of all the bites in Australia, over 80 percent are 'dry bites'. This means the snake has chosen not to envenomate and it was a warning bite.

We really can live alongside such a venomous species without harming them.

Mosquito fish

While most people know about the European carp and the damage it does to the ecologies of our lakes and rivers, few have heard of the mosquito fish (*Gambusia holbrook*i), which is common in our waterways and also does a great deal of ecological damage.

The mosquito fish is a small fish (males are around three centimetres in length and females six centimetres). They were introduced into Australian waterways in 1925 to control mosquitos and quickly spread across much of Australia, including our district. So how can such a small fish that goes largely unnoticed impact upon the ecology of our waterways?

For a start, the mosquito fish did not control the mosquitos and mosquito larvae any better than the native species. However, they did have a voracious appetite for fish eggs and fish larvae as well as frogs' eggs and newly hatched tadpoles. They also nip the fins of native fish, leaving them vulnerable to infection and less capable of swimming after prey. Mosquito fish are very aggressive and will attack and harass larger species. They will eat anything that will fit into their mouths, meaning they are is in direct competition with native species that also eat small aquatic creatures. All across the mosquito fish's range the populations of native fish and amphibians have fallen dramatically.

Mosquito fish are prolific breeders and can out-breed native species. They give birth to live young three or four times a year. The young attain breeding age in only four to six weeks. This puts enormous pressure on the native species.

Mosquito fish are very hardy and can survive in a wide range of water

temperatures, in water with low levels of oxygen and in turbid and polluted waters. It is a tough little survivor that can weather droughts with its ability to survive in small, muddy remnant waters.

One of the native fish most affected by the mosquito fish are the various rainbow fish species (genus Melanotaenia). These are small fish with horizontal stripes, often like a rainbow, along their sides. Many water catchments have their own unique species of rainbow fish. Some species from small, de-graded catchments are particularly vulnerable with a number of species being listed as "Critically Endangered" and others as "Endangered" or "Threatened". Luckily, they do well as aquarium fish and can be saved. Another endangered fish species is the purple spotted gudgeon (Mogurnda adspersa). It also does well in aquariums and captive bred gudgeons have been reintroduced to several water catchments. The mosquito fish has also had an impact upon ten frog species including several species of bellfrog.

In short, the mosquito fish is the fish from hell. The only thing good about it is that it seems to be able to eat cane toad eggs. In Victoria it has now been declared a restricted noxious fish. It is illegal to keep the fish or to release it into a waterway (even if it was just caught moments before). If the fish is sighted it should be reported to the Fisheries Victoria Customer Service Centre on 136 186.



Swooping season here again

As the weather gets warmer and the days longer, we also start to see the occasional swooping bird. Native birds enter their breeding season in spring, and some may get protective of their young.

Swooping is a normal, temporary behaviour for native birds like magpies, butcherbirds and masked lapwings to defend their eggs and chicks for a short time while their young are most vulnerable.

"Not all birds swoop during the breeding season, so the presence of magpies or other common swooping birds does not necessarily mean you will be swooped", said Lachlan Clarke, Manager Statewide Wildlife Advisory Services at DEECA.

This behaviour only lasts a short time, usually ending once the young have left the nest.

If you are worried about being caught out by a protective bird this spring, there are some steps you can take to feel safe, while also protecting our native birds: avoid known swooping hotspots; move quickly, don't run if near a swooping bird; wear protective head and eye coverings; don't harass birds, as this can escalate swooping; don't feed birds or destroy their nests.

Remember - all native wildlife is protected by law. Harassing, harming or disturbing native birds and other wildlife is illegal in Victoria and penalties apply.

Birds of a Feather

Australian Reed Warbler



The Reed Warblers are back. walking along the bike path near the Rushworth railway ponds I heard their familiar call. The recent rain had brought the Pobblebonks (Bango frog) out of hibernation and along with other frog species they were all in full voice and the call of the reed warbler could also be heard deep in the vegetation. The reed warbler is not a spectacular bird, only a little larger than a house sparrow and mostly drab brown in colour with white on the throat and with a pale eyebrow (supercilium). Although difficult to see in the reeds its strong voice makes it's presence felt with its different combinations of calls, sometimes harsh and loud with staccato 'chucks' and at other times sweet and melodious.

The Australian reed warblers can be found throughout the Australian wetlands most of the year but in the south, as in Rushworth, they migrate north in April to enjoy the warmth and return in September to breed. The males are the first to arrive and claim a territory. They grip a stalk with their feet sideways, raise a small crest and sing loudly to warn off other males and to attract females as they don't pair with the same mate each year. The male will also build a pseudonest - a nest-like structure - which is not for brooding but to attract a female by showing how good a nest builder he is. Once paired up the couple will build a nest together in the reeds and raise their young feeding mostly on insects and spiders.

Reed warbles may be difficult to see but with a little patience, listening to their warbling which continues with only short breaks, they will show up moving around in the wetland vegetation. It's a song of spring in the wetlands – insistent but cheerful.

Heavy penalties decided at Rushworth Court House

Magistrate Curtain explained to a defendant that it was bad enough to be driving without a licence, but to be swaying all over the road and testing positive to alcohol when Sergeant Durston pulled him over, was completely unacceptable. The defendant's solicitor applied for an adjournment of the case. The magistrate was not in the mood to adjourn, sending the defendant to gaol for a month.

Local men were penalised for unroadworthy vehicles and speeding while another pair were fined for carrying and firing a rifle on a Sunday at Whroo.

A farmer was fined \$100 for failing to carry a knapsack on a tractor while slashing grass. A spark had started a fire.

A Camberwell solicitor was placed on \$100 bond to be of good behaviour for twelve months for lighting a fire without a permit on a bush block near Rushworth. (A few years later, in 1999, well after his bond had expired, the same solicitor was convicted of importing and trafficking cocaine worth \$2.7 million!)

Shire

Waranga Shire called tenders to operate the pan service, after the contractor sought a rise in the \$31 per week paid for his collection service in Rushworth, \$33 per week in Murchison. In the previous contract period, 30 homes had converted to sewer or septic systems. Properties still using the pan service faced a Shire levy increase.

Shire officers welcomed two State Government officials to "talk tourism", visiting Whroo cemetery, the puddling-machine, the Balaclava mine and the aboriginal waterhole. With recent interest from people seeking to purchase abandoned Whroo township blocks, and Shire hopes of gathering rate revenue from new buyers, the next step was to confer with the Forests Commission, seeking its views on possible residential re-occupation of Whroo.

Community

Waranga Memorial Hospital Ladies Auxiliary applauded two generous donations. Mrs Cole, mother of the hospital's Matron Marion Cole had contributed \$30 to assist the Auxiliary's work and the Golf Club Ladies had raised \$43 through the holding of a Charity Day competition on the local course.

People

"Popular Chronicle office girl and typesetter, Sharon Jones, announced her engagement to Allan Perry at a party at her parents' home in Murchison Road on Saturday night. The party was attended by 120 friends."

Murchison Guide Lynda Bertram received her Queen's Guide award from the District Guide Commissioner at a ceremony in the RSL Hall. The Commissioner was her mother Helen!

Ownership of Colbinabbin Supply Store passed from Fred and Nora Reed to John and Irene Gibbs, bringing their family of three children from Katamatite.

Rushworth Hotel (the Bottom Pub) had new licencees Bob and Christine Waugh, in partnership with George and Janice Saynor.

The Greenaway brothers offered "a reward for information leading to the arrest of the person who has been tampering with our tractor and property on our land on the Stanhope Road".

Schools

Rushworth High School started third term with new arts and craft teacher Miss Ursula Betka from Warracknabeal, and taking up his first teaching post was Mr Alan Akerstrom, from Seattle, Washington, in the USA. He was to teach Geography and History, "and likes basketball and soccer".

Miss Anne Marie O'Connor attended Rushworth High to explain the processes to apply for various tertiary courses to the Form Six class. She was photographed with students Noel Tuohey and Geoff Burge.

St Mary's School received a donation of a stove for school use from Mrs Blackshaw, together with a steam and dry iron to feature as a raffle prize. Sister Nora asked whether any mothers could assist in teaching the children to crochet and to sew.

Football

Murchison Seconds lost the Kyabram District Football League Grand Final, down to Tallygaroopna 9-15 to 15-10. The senior flag went to Nagambie 10-19 over Merrigum 9-13. Girgarre won the Thirds premiership 10-6 to Lancaster's 7-3.

At the Grand Final there was discussion among KDFL officials, hoping that Stanhope would join if the club left the Goulburn Valley League. Some Rushworth players expressed concern about continuing in the five-team Heathcote League, and angling towards the KDFL. The discussion was to continue through much of the summer which followed.

Rushworth Under-15s had their grand final a week later than the men after a draw during the finals. On a miserable wet day, Heathcote won easily, with pats on the back to Tiger brothers Greg and Malcolm Cruz, cousins Peter and Alan Hawking, Joe Barlow, Anthony Fullarton, and Craig Beck returning from injury.

At the presentation night, Mrs Eileen Lambden presented the Lambden trophy for the senior best and-and-fairest to Mark Mackinder, and the Ladies Auxiliary President Mrs Win Hageman handed over a big cheque to Club President Don Perry.

Golf

A-grade champ at Rushworth was David Heily, defeating Graham Spence, Norm Geisler taking out B-grade over Aub Geisler. D-Grade champion was Rob Borger, ahead of Noel Perry. The C-grade final between Gordon Raglus and Ralph Barlow had been delayed. President Ivan Jell selected a President's team for a contest against the Captain's team, the latter taking the honours. In a stableford event, Peter Meagher and Jack Borger led the field home in A-grade, the promising young Slim Perry taking the B-grade contest.

Breaking their handicaps at Associates golf were Maree Cogan and Elsie Laurie. Leaders in the Frank Richards Trophy were Alice Brown and Marj Johnston.

Bowls

The opening of Rushworth bowls season had capacity numbers on the green (when there was only one green). President Geoff Beck called on wife Mary to roll the first kitty, Associates president Mrs Linda Duke sending down the first bowl. Winners on the day were Bill and Mary Furphy with Joan Whitehead the third member of the rink.

Ron McLeod was commended and warmly thanked for all his work to brighten up the clubhouse.

Tennis

With the season fast approaching, only ten girls and two boys had signed up to play junior tennis for Rushworth. Made it difficult for the club to advise the Association how many teams it would field, with a fixture still



Revolution – the chainsaw

In the mid-1950s, chainsaws were introduced to Rushworth by Maurice Hitchcock, revolutionising the way that work was done in the forest. In the blink of an eye one man could cut far more timber in a day than had been humanly possible in the past. This innovation, in conjunction with replacement of horse drawn vehicles with motorised trucks caused major changes to the local timber industry.

The number of men working in the forest would dramatically decline after that time, although many continued to work in the old ways as a means of supplementing their income. One such old timer was Alfred Thomas, who had been born in 1891 in Bealiba, another Victorian gold mining town. Alf was in his 60s when these significant changes were taking place.

Moving to Rushworth

Alf, the tenth of twelve children in his family, was married in his hometown of Bealiba in 1911 and the couple had two children before he served in the First World War between 1915 and 1919. Sadly, the war seems to have cost the pair their marriage as they divorced in 1919 after his return from Europe. He moved to Rushworth after the war and remarried, this time to Ida Smith.

The Smith family had been in Rushworth since the late 1850s. Ida's grandparents were both Irish convicts, transported to Tasmania for seven years for what now seem like trivial theft offences. After their release they married and moved to Victoria, and ultimately to Rushworth, where they lived for the rest of their lives. Ida's grandfather "Old Jack Smith" had been a resident of the town for 50 years when he died in 1909.

Timber cutting – the end of an era

Alf Thomas continued to work in the forest in the old ways, cutting timber by hand and transporting it into Rushworth station by horse and cart. In the 1950s he supplied five-foot billets to Bill Corner, who in turn was supplying firewood for the boilers at dairy companies at Stanhope and Girgarre.

The chainsaw revolution had begun back in the 1920s, when Andreas Stihl invented an electric machine that required two men to operate because it weighed a massive 64 kg. Shortly afterwards his business partner developed a petrol chainsaw. After World

War 2, the first one-man chain saws were developed, using "lighter materials, metal alloys and improved engine designs".²

Jonsereds chainsaws

As noted above, Maurice Hitchcock introduced chainsaws to the local area after becoming an agent for Jonsereds chainsaws. Over the years, the Jonsereds company has been incorporated into the well-known Husqyarna brand.

"Mooky" decided that the best way to display his new product was to hold a demonstration of how it worked and what it was capable of doing. Because the forest workers were operating at many locations he decided that the best place to demonstrate the new machine was in a pub yard after knock off time, when there was sure to be a number of workers engaging in what was known as "The Six O'Clock Swill" i.e. getting down as many beers as possible after work before the pubs officially closed at 6pm. Word of mouth would do the rest.

There were sceptics in the crowd at Brice's middle pub, suggesting that there was no way that such a new-fangled machine would be able to cut through the famous Rushworth forest hardwood, the red ironbark. Looking back there must have been a sense of amazement as the Jonsered chainsaw did indeed cut through logs easily, and in record time.

Perhaps there was also some trepidation amongst those who could foresee what this meant for the ongoing employment of those cutting timber out in the forest. Old timers like Alf Thomas would gradually disappear from the forest and the numbers of people employed in the timber industry would decline dramatically.

A Name from the Past

Ellen Louisa Jones, known always as Nell

Ellen Louisa Jones was known to all as Nell. Some residents, even her neighbours, would not have known the given names of a fine contributor to the town of Rushworth.

A small fraction of her contributions was captured in Waranga News of 22 January, 1981, about four weeks after her death in December of 1980.

"DEATH: JONES, NELL.

Passed away 23rd December 1980 (suddenly), loving sister of Rita, sister-in-law of Frank, auntie of Frank, Graeme, Jennifer (dec) and Ian. Loving great aunt of Peter and Gillian. Peacefully sleeping.

On the 23rd December 1980, the whole town was shocked to hear of the sudden death of Nell Jones in her 74th year.

Nell lived in Rushworth all her life, being born into the Simpson family who were pioneers of Rushworth. In 1933 she married George Jones and he predeceased her by 24 years ago.

She leaves a family of two sons and two daughters – Ethel (Mrs R. Hageman), Ron, George and Margaret (Mrs Perrett), twelve grandchildren, and one greatgranddaughter. Her death being the first in the family is mourned by her sister Rita (Mrs F. Hageman), and brothers Alf, Tom, and Bill.

Nell will be missed in this community and remembered for her work at the Waranga Memorial Hospital. She will be sadly missed by the Brownies as she had been their much-loved Brown Owl for eighteen years.

Many relatives and friends, including the Brownies, attended her funeral service at St. Paul's Church of England on 27th December."

One could only guess at the number of Brownies Nell would have guided in those eighteen years. We can also note that Nell's sister married a Hageman, as did one of her daughters.

Ellen "Nell" Jones was buried in the Rushworth cemetery, after a subdued Christmas for her family.

Today her direct descendants include many locals who might have the surname Jones, Perry and Snelling, and just as many nephews, nieces, great nephews and great nieces and so on. Hageman, Harcoan and Parker are just three names which come to mind.

Being found

"Grace always arrives before we're ready, and joy always breaks out before we've figured out who deserves it"

Life is rarely quiet. Most weeks seem full to the brim — with work, family, community and all the unexpected things that come our way. Some days the wind blows cold and hard; other days the sun surprises us with its warmth. We say goodbye to people we love, we welcome new beginnings and through it all we keep moving, sometimes with purpose, sometimes just hanging on.

And then, layered over the rhythm of our own lives, there is the constant stream of news from the wider world. Too often it feels heavy — stories of conflict, of violence, of lives cut short or broken. Every so often there are glimmers of hope — a community coming together, a step toward justice, a gesture of kindness. But still the weight of the world presses in.

Winners . . . losers

It's in moments like these, both personal and global, that I notice how quick we are to divide life into categories of winners and losers, successful and unsuccessful, deserving and undeserving. How easily we blame people for being 'lost': the addict for their addiction, the unemployed for not trying hard enough, the person struggling with mental illness for weakness, the young person searching for identity as 'confused,' the refugee as "jumping the queue."

We tell ourselves their lostness is their fault and in doing so, we keep their pain at arm's length.

But then I open up the fifteenth chapter of Luke's Gospel, where Jesus tells three stories:

• A shepherd leaves ninety-nine sheep to

search for the one that has strayed.

- A woman turns her house upside down to find a single lost coin.
- A father loses not one, but two sons one who runs away and wastes everything, the other who stays home but grows cold, resentful, and refuses to celebrate. The father's heart aches for both of them.

In every case, what matters is not blame, but the search. Not condemnation, but welcome. And each story ends in celebration:



neighbours called in, friends gathered, music and feasting, joy overflowing.

At Eugene Peterson's funeral, he was the writer of The Message translation of the Bible, his son Leif gave a eulogy. He said his father really only had one sermon, one message he preached all his life, whispered to his children at night, spoken in a hundred different ways. The message was this: "God loves you. He's on your side. He's coming after you. He's relentless."

I can't think of a better summary of these parables.

We are found

We too are sought. When we wander into dark valleys, God does not stop searching.

We too are found. When we feel invisible, God lifts us onto his shoulders.

We too are welcomed. When shame tells us we are unworthy, God runs to embrace us.

We too are celebrated. When we expect a lecture, God throws a feast and calls us

This is the heart of the Gospel: not about finding your way, but about being found.

And yet, like the older brother in Jesus' story, we can find it hard to accept. We want fairness. We want people to earn their place. We want the lost to repent before they are embraced. But God's grace doesn't work that way. Grace always arrives before we're ready, and joy always breaks out before we've figured out who deserves it.

The challenge is whether we will join the celebration, or stay outside with our arms folded.

And that's where I come back to our own lives, our own community. Because we are not only the ones called to seek and celebrate, we are also the lost.

We get lost in illness and grief. We get lost in strained relationships. We get lost in doubt, in pride, in shame. We get lost in the quiet struggles no one else sees.

And still, God's relentless love is for us,

He's on our side

Perhaps that's why Jesus tells three stories instead of one. Because he knows how easily we resist grace. He knows how quickly we prefer judgment. So he tells it again, and again, and again, until the truth begins to sink in:

God loves you. He's on your side. He's coming after you. He's relentless.

And maybe that's the invitation for us, here in our small part of the world. To live as people who know we've been found. To welcome others not with blame but with joy. To throw parties that look a little like heaven's.

Because in the end, the heart of the good life isn't about finding your way. It's about being found.

This is the gospel, and it's good news.





BOOK IT IN

May Gibbs (The Mother of the Gumnuts)
Maureen Walsh. Angus and Robertson 1958

Cecilia May Gibbs was born at Cheam Fields in Surrey in 1877 to two artistically talented parents and grew up with British children's stories filled with traditional pixies, fairies and goblins but when her family immigrated to take up farmland near Adelaide in 1881, May was introduced to the very different flora and fauna of the Australian bush. As an adult and a talented artist, she began work as an illustrator of conventional British children's stories but gradually the image of an Australian bush fairyland began to creep into her imagination.

Unable to make a profit from the land in South Australia, her family moved to Perth and May continued her work as an illustrator and as a writer. In 1900 she returned to England to further her artistic studies at several well known art schools in London and on returning to Perth, she began writing and drawing for local Perth magazines and it was at this time that the writing of fairy stories for Australian children was born. She submitted some stories and illustrations to local publishers but initially no-one was interested. Nothing daunted, May tried again in Sydney where the New South Wales Education Department, enchanted by her work, used her stories in their Primary Readers and Australian children were introduced to the world of the wicked Banksia Men, Snugglepot and Cuddlepie, Little Ragged Blossom and other fairies of the Australian bush. In 1913 her first two books about the Gumnut Babies were published in Australia and sold out. Numerous books with more and more Australian references were published and the bush babies moved from a new phenomenon to become part of Australian folklore and to give great pleasure and a sense of identity to generations of Australian children.

Throughout her career, May always maintained strict supervision of her work, allowing no interference with her format or accepting any criticism of her ideas and as she changed her publishers with great regularity, she became renowned for reducing her printers and editors to jelly and gained a reputation for being 'difficult' but she remained steadfastly true to her vision throughout.

During the depression sales of her books declined but she joined the ranks of Australian cartoonists with a popular comic strip in the Sunday News. Paperback copies continued to sell slowly at reduced prices so American publishers were approached but her stories had no connection to American children and a possible movie was never made. May retreated to her little cottage on the edge of Double Bay and died in 1969, still fiercely independent and still terrifying her publishers but she loved children and understood them very well. Her bushland characters, like May herself, faced disappointment, met good and bad people and lived in a bustling, busy world. This book shows us the fascinating woman behind the stories who maintained her artistic integrity all her life and left us with a famous series of books that have never been out of print.


