Wishing everyone a very Merry Christmas and a safe and happy holiday season.



Lots of action at a peaceful Whroo location

Despite being officially closed for new burials, the beautiful Whroo cemetery reserve continues to attract visitors, drawn by the bush location and its history within the former gold-field township.

The cemetery is overseen and managed by a group of ten volunteers, not all of whom have ancestors buried within the reserve. The Whroo Cemetery Trust has commenced a project to position stones around the perimeter of graves presently shown only by mounds of earth. This improvement in the overall appearance is based on hundred-year-old photos of decorative stones fitted to graves in years past, and has been well received by recent visitors.

The Trust is very pleased to have completed the official Whroo Cemetery Trust website, making detailed information available to any remote internet location, not just to Whroo visitors. Featured on the site are over 100 obituaries extracted from early newspapers, detailing the lives and deaths of some of those laid to rest in the cemetery.

The website may be visited at whroocemeterytrust.org and was designed and created by Dr Alison Baird and Ms Lauren Baird, as their voluntary and valued contribution to the work of the Trust.

The display of website details was helped by the recent discovery of copies of additional early cemetery records, receipts issued after graves were purchased, some over 150 years ago. The Trust hopes that anyone holding originals of cemetery data will allow those documents to be scanned and returned, a straightforward and common practice in 2025.

The Trust has long welcomed interest from people hoping to place a new memorial tribute to an ancestor in the cemetery. A special area has been set aside for placement of plaques if a confirmed burial lacks the specific number and location of the grave. Incomplete records mean that many graves cannot be matched to specific names.

An approach must be made to the Trust, for consideration and approval of the design of the tribute. Under Victorian law, only qualified and registered stonemasons are permitted to perform this type of work, and the Trust can suggest names for the descendants to approach.

Unfortunately, a breach of the law occurred in mid-2025, when an unauthorised memorial was erected on an unmarked grave. The Trust remains interested to speak with descendants of Mr John Papachanzie, who was buried in March 1871.

The Trust has affirmed that in the event of any further breach, there will be no option but to have the memorial removed for return to the family, at descendant cost.

The recent Annual General Meeting re-elected Alan McLean as Trust Chair, Graham Pettifer as Deputy Chair, and Christine Norris as Secretary-Treasurer for 2026

Responsible and respectful visitors are always welcome at the cemetery. Newcomers to the district are especially encouraged to visit this peaceful heritage legition.



Local boy secures 7th place at Brisbane Pokémon regional event

The energy was electric on Melbourne Cup weekend as hundreds of Pokémon enthusiasts gathered for the 2025 Brisbane Regional TCG Championships. Among the standout performers was Rushworth local Patrick Williams, who achieved an impressive 7th place out of 81 players in the senior section, for players aged between twelve to sixteen.

Fourteen year-old Patrick's consistent performance across eleven rounds over the two day event earned him a coveted spot in the Top 8.

"It was really tough, but also a lot of fun," Patrick said after the event. "Every match teaches you something new. I just wanted to do my best."


Pokemon TCG is a strategic 50 minute battle between two

players, each using a 60-card deck made up of Pokémon, Energy, and Trainer cards. It is a blend of probability, planning, and tactical adaptation and the game rewards both creativity and consistency-traits Patrick demonstrated throughout the

Patrick credits the support from his friends and family, his local Pokemon league at Gamers Resort Shepparton and his online coach Canada, helping him refine deck-building skills and in-game strategy.

He travels regularly Melbourne, Bendigo Ballarat compete in local tournaments and has competed in many other large regional events in Brisbane, Perth and Sydney over the last years, lucky was enough to travel to London to play at an international tournament earlier this year.





With this Top 8 finish, Patrick Williams moves forward with valuable championship points and newfound attention from the Pokemon community. His next focus is preparing for the regional events in New Zealand, Sydney and Melbourne next year, with the goal to qualify for

New immunisation provider in Campaspe

Campaspe Shire Council has announced that it has appointed Kernow Environmental Services to deliver its immunisation program.

Kernow brings extensive experience in public health and working in Local Government settings and is committed to supporting families and individuals across the shire.

Acting Director Communities Janelle Wheatley said she welcomed the appointment which supports a smooth transition, prioritising continuity of care for the community.

"We are delighted with the outcome of the tender and want to reinforce that the Campaspe community will still be able to enjoy accessing Council's immunisation service in their local area, ensuring equity of access no matter where in our shire you live," Ms Wheatley said.

Stay protected this Mosquito season – prepare early

The Goulburn Valley Public Health Unit (GVPHU) is urging residents and visitors across northern Victoria to take simple steps to protect themselves from mosquito borne diseases.

Recent mosquito seasons have seen cases of Japanese Encephalitis (JE) acquired along the Goulburn-Murray River system. Japanese Encephalitis is spread through the bite of infected mosquitoes and, while rare, can cause serious illness.

"Keeping our community safe from mosquito-borne illnesses is something we can all work towards," says Dr Will Cross, Clinical Director at GVPHU.

"Simple actions like using insect repellent and wearing protective clothing can make a big difference. For those who are eligible, getting vaccinated against Japanese Encephalitis adds another important layer of protection."

How to protect yourself this mosquito

- Mosquitoes can bite through tight clothing. Cover up wear long, loose, light-coloured clothing
- Use mosquito repellents containing active ingredients like DEET or Picaridin. Apply evenly to all exposed skin and clothing
- Limit outdoor activity if lots of mosquitoes are about
- Remove stagnant water where mosquitoes can breed around your home or campsite

Every time we try to eat healthy along comes Christmas, Easter, summer, Friday (or Tuesday) and ruins it for us!

- On holidays, make sure your accommodation is fitted with mosquito netting or screens
- Use 'knockdown' fly spray, mosquito coils or plug-in repellent where you gather to sit or eat outdoors
- Don't forget the kids always check the insect repellent label. On babies, you might need to spray or rub repellent on their clothes instead of their skin. Avoid applying repellent to the hands of babies or young children
- Get vaccinated against JE if eligible: Free vaccination is available to people living or working in high-risk areas in northern Victoria. Check eligibility at the Department of Health's website. Vaccines can be accessed through participating councils, GPs and pharmacies (consultation fees may apply)

"By taking these simple precautions, we can reduce the risk of mosquito-borne illness in our community, Your actions protect not just you, but your family, friends and neighbours," Dr Cross adds.

Battery man powers towards \$1 Million for children's health

For 16 years, Paul Archer from Rushworth has been turning discarded lead-based batteries into vital funding for sick children in the Goulburn Valley.

Through his recycling initiative, Paul has raised an incredible \$880,000 for GV Health's Child and Adolescent Unit. Each battery collected helps fund equipment, programs and spaces that support children during their hospital stay.

Now Paul is on a mission to reach the \$1 million milestone and he's asking the community to help finish what he started. After suffering a heart attack last year, Paul can no longer travel across the region as he once did. Instead, he's inviting community

members to drop off their old lead batteries at his business, Natrad Shepparton (20 Campbell Street). He is also seeking volunteers to help load the batteries for recycling.

Across the Goulburn Valley, thousands of unused batteries sit in garages, sheds, and farm yards. Together, they could be transformed into vital support for children in hospital. Whether it's one car battery or a uteload, every donation brings Paul closer to the million-dollar mark.

Looking through the pages of past 'Rushworth Chronicles'compiled by former district resident Alan McLean



10 deaths in tragic weekend on district roads

There was a horror weekend on roads within a 60-kilometre radius of Rushworth. Peter Bray of Girgarre died after his motorcycle collided with a semi-trailer on the notorious intersection of Midland Highway and McEwen Road.

Mrs Bonita Campbell of Elmore died after a collision with a sportscar, with a passenger in that second car also killed, and several teenagers injured. Other fatal smashes were near Wyuna and Nagambie, taking the total killed in the district that weekend to a truly shocking ten.

Politics

Local Federal Member for Murray, Bruce Lloyd, was easily re-elected in his seat with a big win for the Coalition in the election that followed the sacking of the Whitlam Labor government.

Waranga Council announced a reduction in rates for properties including farms, but Rushworth residents faced a 33% rise in their water rates. Receipt of flood grants and indexation to regulate wage rises were said to have enabled the Shire to make the cuts. In a separate and independent decision, Rushworth Water Trust announced the big lift in water rates.

Cr John Hammond of Murchison resigned from Council as he was moving to Woodend.

Court

A driver picked up by Sergeant Durston blew 0.248% blood alcohol, the equivalent of 16 7-ounce glasses of beer. The man said he had drunk half a bottle of perfume, his defence calling up a chemist to say perfume was 80% alcohol. A soft magistrate fined the man only \$150 with loss of licence for three months, after accepting the beer version ahead of the perfume story.

Schools

With additional staff appointed to Rushworth High School for 1976, an urgent call went out for more houses for teacher rental in Rushworth, nearby towns or vacant houses on farm properties.

Community

Singer Bill McCormack was the star attraction at the annual Apex Club Christmas lunch in the Shire Hall. Club President Ralph Barlow guided his elderly grandmother Bessie, the oldest Senior Citizen, for the cutting of the cake.

Rushworth Lions welcomed District Governor Geoff Burrell to their regular meeting at the Criterion Hotel.

Local swimming pool roster for December

included Peg Taylor, Howard Hawking, Ron Risstrom, Jenny Baldwin, Helen Clarke, Bev Hitchcock and Marj Morgan.

Colbinabbin Fire Brigade roster for December listed Tom McEvoy, P. Stewart, D. Brown, Len Purvis, John Morgan, Brian Eliis. Frank West, Joey Ellis and J. Mason.

People

The other Alan McLean and Lynette Perry were married on 6 December in Rushworth's Anglican church. Counting the flower-girl, 11 people made up the wedding party.

Lionel Johnson and Frances (nee Kennedy) added son Graeme to Matthew in Shepparton. Eddie and Isobel Gleeson welcomed two grandsons on 2 December, Marcus for Linton and Lynette Gleeson, Haig for Neville and Wendy Varcoe.

Another Haig, Poulson of Rushworth, became engaged to Mary-Lou Reilly of Numurkah.

Former Rushworth dry cleaner Ron Pengelly died at Castlemaine, and Waranga Memorial Hospital's Matron Cole resigned to take a role at Kyabram.

Within a major family squabble, a Wanalta man used a public notice to disassociate himself from his four named sisters, three of them living locally.

Carl Williams, Rushworth jeweller, published a notice headed "Compliments of the Season", beneath which it read "To one and all thanking you for your support over the past 50 years."

Other local traders extending greetings included Ampol Service Station (Peter and Colleen Draper), Hilders' Garage (Eric and Ray) and Muirs' Motor Engineering Works (Greg and Denise). (Bardy McLeod was also selling bowser petrol, making four service stations, with at least five others in Rushworth selling by the 44-gallon drum.)

A big Saturday night was looming for one unnamed couple. "Wanted. Child Minder, for Saturday night. Phone Rushworth 132". Which family, and who were the kids?

Cricket

Rushworth A-grade 60 runs (C. Hageman 16 G. Hageman 11), Tongala 4/94, with Rushworth saved from outright embarrassment by a washed-out second day.

Rushworth B-grade were in trouble against Ky Fire Brigade (R. Hageman 3/18) but that match was also washed out. (Some of the Hagemans were pretty handy cricketers!)

Stars for Rushworth juniors were bowler Danny Forte, and batsmen Peter Schade (37 runs), Don Potter (30), Gary Hitchcock (23) and Craig Beck (14) in an easy win over Tongala. Against Kyabram, Craig took five wickets for 44. Craig, Peter and Don were

selected to represent Kyabram Cricket in Junior Country Week in January 1976.

Star greyhound Sidanna

Sidanna, bred and raced by Ralph Barlow of Wanalta and trained by Ray Pyle of Mooroopna, had 19 races for 11 wins, three seconds, and the thirds, to be named one of Victoria's best greyhounds.

Auto Club

President Arthur Garvey won a District C-class perpetual shield, after success in a number of races on tracks across the Goulburn Valley.

Waranga Boat Club

Locals were getting into the sailing habit, Max Richards (Shire engineer) joined by Terry Larkins (Shire secretary), Tony Crosbie (Lands Department) and Alan Mackinder (Primary School headmaster).

Bowls

Rushworth Associates Nell Pardy, Lucy Munsey and Florence Perry won trophies in early December, but pennant teams had mixed fortunes. Saturdays were wet apparently, as the men were again washed out. The club's annual tournament was planned for 3-5 January, 1976.

Murchison Gold v Murchison Green had a big build-up of excitement. Washed out! Don Polkinghorne, W. Winnell and E. Jackson won a club competition one dry evening.

Tennis

Rushworth B-grade lined up against Murchison Gold, with Neville Thompson, Colin Barlow, Chris Geisler, Rob Raglus, Doreen Wall, Pauline Wootton, Wendy Meagher and Catherine Poulson. The result was not published.

Football


I should not mention football in December. Despite a well-attended meeting of members having just voted for Rushworth to leave the Heathcote League, the elected committee voted to remain! Apparently Stanhope joining the league, and the return of Tooborac, making seven teams in all, had brought a change in committee thinking.

Greetings

Like Carl Williams 50 years ago, I extend season's greetings to all Waranga News readers, and to the team who put this fine little community newspaper together. Thank

you to readers who sent me messages of appreciation. And even those who had a crack at me about something on this page deserve a safe and happy festive season!





Serving The Community

Those who worked in the forest industries in and around Rushworth have had a long history of serving their communities. As a group, they would often provide their labour and equipment free of charge to support some worthwhile cause. This was often done by providing wood directly to a person or organisation in need. Alternatively, the wood might be supplied for a community event where it was auctioned off with the proceeds going to a particular cause.

Early in World War 1, the wood cutters and carters of Rushworth combined to bring in 35 loads of firewood, which were auctioned off. The resulting cash went to a fund for wounded Australian soldiers, who at the time were still engaged in the Gallipoli campaign. According to the local paper, "this speaks well for our local wood men, and shows what can be accomplished by concerted action." Two local saw millers, Colliver and Anderson, and William Curtis cut up the wood free of charge. There was a community event with a procession of the vehicles loaded with wood, led by the town band, from the Masonic Hall up High Street to the band rotunda, where the band played, and the auction took place.1

Wood Day Carnival

Rushworth's Wood Day Carnival commenced in 1916 or 1917, ostensibly to raise funds for the Mooroopna hospital. The

hospital dated back to the 1870s and later became known as the Goulburn Valley Base Hospital. Many patients from Rushworth spent time in this regional medical facility. One of those was a young Ron Risstrom, who was there for a lengthy stay when he had polio.

In 1925 it was claimed that the amount raised for the hospital in Rushworth was the largest amount raised by any town in the Goulburn Valley for that year – 550 pounds, or over \$55,000 in 2024 money.²

In 1926, a member of the hospital board, Mr Brown, summed up the magnificent Rushworth contribution to the hospital over ten years. He stated that "In Rushworth, every man taking part in the wood day effort undertook to perform a certain task and carried it out according to promise, some cutting the wood, others carting it and so on. In Rushworth, they never met any trouble with their wood day."³

There was a committee which ran the carnival. In 1930, the office bearers were J Howe, President, James Wall, Secretary and J Connelly, Treasurer.⁴ The following year it was noted that since its inception, the Rushworth Wood Day Carnival had raised a total of 4195 pounds (over \$400,000 in 2024 \$A) for the hospital.

Colbinabbin also got into the act. In 1929, the people of Colbinabbin combined to cut, load and transport 25 dray loads and two

truckloads of firewood, which was auctioned off for 80 pounds. Proceeds were sent to the hospital.⁵

Wood Supply

Apart from the fund raising at the carnival, sometimes Rushworth people assisted in directly supplying wood to the hospital, which used large quantities of firewood. In 1942, local Forest Commission staff, timber workers and saw millers cut and stacked 700 tons of firewood, then co-operated with fruit growers from the Shepparton area to transport the wood to the hospital by truck. Apparently, this constituted about four months' supply for the hospital.⁶ They followed up the effort in December that year with another 500 tons.


A year earlier, they had also co-operated with the fruit growers to deliver 215 tons of firewood to the SPC factory in Shepparton, an important industry during the time of the second world war.⁷

In 1951, when Dhurringile mansion was being set up as a home for orphaned Scottish boys, the Rushworth community cut and transported a large amount of firewood to the mansion as a measure of support for the new institution.⁸

Today

It is gratifying to see that in the present day, the tradition of the Wood Days has been re-born. For many years, the Lions Club ran an auction of donated wood as part of the Rushworth Easter Festival until the demise of the club. Proceeds were distributed to various worthy community groups and causes. Now the mantle has been taken up by the amazing group that has for many years been raising funds to support and try to find a cure for cancer for young children, Shearing for Kids with Cancer. What a wonderful legacy of something that had its origins over 100 years earlier.

Cooks Corner

....tis the season to eat what is in season!

Enjoy the following recipes and I wish you all a happy and safe time over the Christmas festivities with family and friends, neighbours and community.

Warm regards from the Seasonal Kitchen x

Corn on the Cob with Lime Butter

100g of soft butter, I large chilli deseeded and finely chopped, 2 tablespoons of chopped fresh coriander and 1 teaspoon of grated lime rind

Couscous & Feta Stuffing

1/3 cup couscous soaked in ½ cup of boiling water for about 5 -10 minutes

Fluff up the couscous with a fork and add 80g of feta cheese, ¼ cup of shredded fresh basil and 2 teaspoons of grated lemon rind, season with cracked pepper.

(Delicious stuffing for pork or chicken.)

Easy Lemon Squeezy Tiramisu Dessert for 4 adults

You will need 1 cup of lemon curd for this dessert (recipe below).

Lemon syrup – combine juice of a lemon with 1/3 cup caster sugar with 2 tablespoons of water, heat until sugar has dissolved and it has a syrup consistency, then cool.

In a bowl add 250g of mascarpone with 100mls of limoncello and whisk until combined

Cut 250g of sponge cake into small squares, store bought or homemade.

Divide half the cake into 4 glasses, drizzle







with half the syrup and top with half the lemon curd and a dollop of the mascarpone mix. Repeat the process and refrigerate for 30 minutes to set.

Lemon Curd

4 egg yolks, 2/3 cup caster sugar, whisk well together until combined but not frothy. Pour into a clean saucepan and add 60 g of butter, 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind and 100mls of strained lemon juice. Stir constantly and bring to a simmer over medium heat. As soon as bubbles appear remove from the heat and keep stirring for a few minutes. Cool before using.

Garden Hints & Tips

A Foreign Flower Adventure

We have just returned from Singapore where, like most tourists, we visited the famous Gardens By The Bay. What a delight to explore for everyone, especially garden lovers! They feature both natural and architectural marvels where innovative thought continues to keep the Gardens sustainable. With plants from all over the world, there is always something blooming! There are several

areas that are free to visit and others require paid admission.

We began at The Cloud Forest, featuring a Jurassic World Experience. Within this massive cooled conservatory (the heat outside can be quite stifling!) over 72,000 plants thrive and more than 50 species have lineages that can be traced back to the Jurassic period, such as ferns, cycads and conifers. These plants once thrived alongside dinosaurs and often served as food for them. This conservatory is a massive glass dome, housing extremely high aerial walkways, massive mechanical dinosaurs and one of the world's tallest indoor waterfalls.

Of course Singapore is famous for its orchids and they were spectacular here amongst the lush greenery. Huge tree ferns, beautiful pink and orange Angel's Trumpet, gorgeous begonias, heuchera, impatiens and fuchsia, all flowering in gorgeous colours to compliment the spectacular foliage, a magnificent Kauri Pine, easily 20 feet tall! Amazing azaleas trained as pillars, which I

had never seen before.

Philodendron Giganteum leaves which certainly were gigantic! Miniature orchids had a magnifying panel in some areas so one could see nature's tiny creations in detail.

From this spectacular



experience we moved across to The Flower Dome. This enormous cooled conservatory holds the Guinness World Record for the largest greenhouse! (the dome's volume is equivalent to Olympic-sized swimming pools!) The roof is fitted with specially selected glass that allows optimal light for plants while minimising solar heat. The Flower Dome features gardens from around the world: Australia, South Africa, South America, California, The Mediterranean, a Succulent Garden, an Olive Grove and The Baobabs with very interesting but unobtrusive sculptures featured amongst the planting.



In the centre was the Flower which has changing displays of temporary flower beds to reflect different seasons and festivals. The current feature was a massive colourful Christmas display of poinsettias amongst cyclamen, gloriously scented humble geraniums with fabulous blooms, daisies, hydrangeas, azaleas and more; sun and shade lovers flowering profusely side by side. I spied some very unusual geraniums that I hadn't seen before with pointy leaves and flowers. Then the special Christmas feature of a massive model railway linking



miniature copies of famous cities of the world decked out for the festive season.

Finally we walked some of the outdoor areas and viewed Singapore's famous Supertrees, eighteen towering vertical garden structures designed to look like



giant trees, ranging from 25 to 50 metres in height.

They have solar panels for energy, rain water collection for irrigation and serve as a habitat for various plants including ferns, vines and orchids. There is a nightly light and sound show plus an aerial walkway. These iconic structures provide sustainable energy while simultaneously providing the infrastructure supporting the site's enormous climate controlled conservatories.

Gardens by the Bay are a "must see" for all visitors to beautiful Singapore!

Christmas Handy Hints

Re-purposing or re-using everyday items or finding easy solutions to general household issues is what I like to do! I hope that you have benefited from some of the 115 odd hints and tips from 2025.

From my home to yours – I wish you all a happy, safe and peaceful Christmas spent in whatever way is you! Please stay safe, don't forget the 'slip-slop-slap', and if you need to drive, then drive carefully.

- * Xmas Hanging lights on a large tree can be a hassle but if you plan a bit like this, it will be easy! Get a rubber backed bath mat (rubber side up) or bath towel doubled over, (so fairly thick) and place under the base of your tree. As you start to decorate your tree you can 'turn' your tree by swivelling the bath towel with tree above (very carefully) until you can complete the required decorating. Placing the tree lights can be achieved the same way, either before or after decorating and once completed to your satisfaction, the lights can then be plugged in for light-up. The mat or towel can be covered with a tree-skirt and no-one except you would know the difference!
- * Xmas Want some tree ornament hooks but can't find any? Get some plastic colour-coated paper clips and bend one end to loop through the ornament hoop and hang on the tree as desired.
- * Xmas Nothing more frustrating than broken lights so a bit of preparation pays dividends. Make sure you get the decorations out way in advance (including the tree lights) and test them thoroughly. At least if anything is wrong you can amend / repair or even replace in time for that special Christmas party event, or for when the kids open their pressies on Christmas morning!

All that remains is for me to thank all our wonderful volunteers who keep the Food Bank and Op Shop and Green Shed operating, all our customers who buy our enormous array of 'stuff' to fund the Food Bank and the community of Rushworth and district who are so generous with their donations.

Have an enjoyable Christmas, safe travels and return refreshed and relaxed to start the New Year.



Forty years! Murchison celebrates!

And that's what we did! Sunday 30 November was a very happy day celebrating what Murchison Historical Society has achieved since it formed forty years ago.

In October 1985, the local Primary School held a 'back-to' event. For this occasion, a book written by Derek Pearson, Bill Stewart and Keith Gregory (about the school history over 125 years as well as an overview of the history of the town) called From Protectorate to Smaller Premier Town, was published.

Stimulated by the book, memorabilia, photos and stories shared on the day, a strong interest in forming an Historical Society grew. By December the first meeting of the Murchison and District Historical Society was held and a Committee of Management elected.

Warwick Finlay became President, a position he held for twenty-eight years and Keith Gregory was elected Vice President holding that office for seventeen years.

By the end of 1986 Bryan and Loel Thomson generously opened Noorilim for a whole week staging 'An Edwardian Christmas' which was very successful and provided initial funds for the Society.

Meetings in the early years were held in the RSL rooms. Guest speakers sharing local history stories and building up a library all added to the knowledge of local history for the 45+ membership. The aim to acquire a home for the Society was always on the agenda. Various sites in Murchison were assessed but none were suitable.

Then in 1995 the Society leased the vacant Infant Welfare building in the River Bank Gardens. It ticked all the boxes; prominent position, in good condition, room for expansion, plenty of parking and, as it was a Council owned building, we received great support.

The Thomson's again invited the public to their beautiful home Noorilim, for 'An Edwardian Evening', this time for tendays. Hundreds of visitors flocked there to experience the mansion set up with models about to enjoy a social evening in the Edwardian period. Profit from this wonderful gesture provided \$43,000.00 and with other accumulated funds we set about adding the gallery area to the rear of the building.

The gallery gave us a large display area but we lacked meeting space and facilities to host group visits in the original rooms to the front of the building. Another extension and remodelling were undertaken to that area and officially opened in Feb 2015. This gave us all abilities access, larger foyer with shopfront for display, wheelchair toilet, suitable kitchen, meeting room and the best view of the River Bank Gardens in Murchison!

Our latest display showcases the achievements and activities of the last forty yrs; listing our exhibitions and events, our awards, books published, interpretive signage installed, weekend and day trips to historic places, and fundraising efforts.

Faithful volunteers have brought the Historical Society to where we are today through their dedication and energy, giving their time voluntarily and sharing their talents. Membership consistently stands at 34 - 38, contributing by taking a turn on the roster, maintaining the Centre and caring for the collection, thus ensuring the Historical Society is a success and the Heritage Centre a great town asset, where we can continue to preserve, promote and present our significant history.



All about wildlife

Kirsty Ramadan from Bohollow Wildlife is a wildlife rescue expert. Here she shares some of her knowledge about our very familiar wildlife neighbours.

And just like that, we are coming to the end of another year....

It has been a year of hard work, attending copious calls for wildlife needing help and caring for numerous native lives who find themselves at one of our two Bohollow Shelters. For my family and I at our founding Bohollow Wildlife Shelter at Bunbartha, it's been a year of extra hard work repairing flood damage and attempting to find our feet again after a few very difficult years. We still have a long way to go before everything is totally back to normal, but we are making progress.

We are at the halfway mark for the chaotic baby bird season. Deb has taken on a few of the baby birds this season to lessen our load here a little but home at the moment is awaking to the incessant calls of nestling and fledgling birds, all demanding they be the first fed. There are no mornings of lazily easing into the day at this time of year!

As always, our year has been full of many highs and lows as the never ending roller coaster ride of wildlife care and rescue marches on. The amount of wildlife who find themselves in trouble and need a helping hand never seems to dwindle and as the wildlife caring fraternity is currently very short in numbers on the ground, we get called further and further afield, pushing our resources even further beyond our limit.

If you require our assistance and we cannot attend immediately, please be patient. Little things like being able to transport to us and following advice on what you can do until one of us can get there or a critter can get to the shelter, can make a massive difference to both us and the animal concerned.

If we sound tired, it is because we are more than tired, we are downright fatigued and your call may be one of many we have tended to that day. If you cannot get a critter to us, fear not, we will get to you, but if it takes hours, please don't get impatient with us, or worse, treat us with contempt. We live, breathe and walk the walk of being a 24/7 rescue and care service for wildlife. Our hearts hurt more than most when we cannot attend immediately for whatever reason or if a rescue goes wrong or if the kindest thing we can do for an animal is humanely end their pain.

Wildlife rescue is a team effort and begins with you, the general public. For every one

of you who choose to stop for that injured bird or roo on a roadside, for everyone of you who finds a fallen nest in your garden, a bird hanging up a tree entangled in fishing line at a remote camp-site, creek or river, for each and every one of you who care enough about the living creatures who have been walking this land well before we were, we thank you from the bottom of our hearts.

ON THE BRINK

Looking at endangered or extinct flora and fauna.

this column we have often referred to the importance of biodiversity in maintaining a ecosystem. It's well-functioning increasingly recognised that the scarcity or extinction of any flora or fauna will upset the balance of nature and we have ecologists and natural resource managers working to identify and address potential losses, many of which (but not all) are consequences of human activity. In more recent times the value of Indigenous land and sea management has been recognised, its success being acknowledged as largely due to a deep and different connection to the land. While the mainstream tradition has been to research, classify and 'manage' aspects of the ecosystem from outside, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island people connected to Country see that they are part of the ecological system and manage it from within. Plants, animals and landscapes are foundations of identity and are essential to a person's sense of self, family and place.

As species of plants and animals and their relationships are the focus of Aboriginal identity and spirituality, the impacts of plant and animal loss we have been describing take on another dimension. The decline of certain species affects not only ecosystem functions, but also cultural knowledge, food systems, language, ceremony and Country.

Below are two accounts of how the decline of certain plant species can affect not only ecosystem functions, but also cultural knowledge, food systems, language, ceremony and Country.

Note: These representative examples, publicly shared (not restricted knowledge). It should also be noted that Indigenous Knowledge Systems vary widely, and it's important not to assume that everyone holds the same understanding of concepts, traditions, or information

1. River Red Gums - (Murray-Darling Basin Nations)

For many First Nations along the Murray-Darling Basin (e.g., Yorta Yorta, Ngarrindjeri, Barkandji), the river red gum (Eucalyptus camaldulensis) is a cultural keystone species.Red gums are seen as living ancestors connected to story, songlines, and obligations of care for the river system. Their decline from altered flooding isn't just ecological; it represents a break in the cultural relationship with the river, which depends on healthy floodplains.

Impacts

- Loss of habitat for species that are totems or culturally significant (fish, waterbirds)
- Loss of bark suitable for traditional canoes, coolamons, and scartree practices
- Decline in river health that disrupts cultural fishing practices and ceremonies tied to water

2. Bushfoods & Wildflower Species -(Southwest WA Noongar Nation)

The Noongar peoples describe many flowering plants (e.g., Banksia, Macrozamia, Quandong, yams) as part of a seasonal knowledge system (Noongar six seasons). The flowering of certain plants signal when animals can be hunted, when certain foods are ready, or when fires should be lit. Declines caused by dieback (Phytophthora), land clearing, and warming lead to breakdown of seasonal indicators.

Impacts

- Reduced availability of key bushfoods used in teaching and ceremony
- Weakened intergenerational transmission of women's knowledge, because specific plants are tied to gathering, cooking, and teaching roles
- Erosion of language: many plant names encode ecological knowledge (growth patterns, uses, timing).

Birds of a Feather

Lorikeets

With some of the ironbarks flowering in Rushworth at the moment we have seen large numbers of lorikeets noisily feeding on the blossom, but which species of lorikeets are they? Most people are familiar with the rainbow lorikeet with its beautiful bright colours and its harsh call but there are very few around Rushworth. They are one of the larger lorikeets (about 28cm) and are very aggressive towards other birds so where they have built up in large numbers they can become a nuisance. In some ways we are lucky that there are so few locally despite their beauty.

It is the musk lorikeet which is in large numbers around town feeding on the flowering ironbarks and making quite a racket. They are mostly green (about 22 cm) and can be identified by the red on their forehead and cheek and a yellow patch on their belly under their wings. Although they make a lot of noise when feeding they don't have the harsh call of the rainbow lorikeets.

There are two other lorikeets that you may see feeding as well. These are the purple-crowned lorikeet and the little lorikeet. Both are small (about 15 cm) and we are one of the few locations where the two can be found together. The purple-crowned lorikeet has a range from WA across SA to central Victoria while the little lorikeet has a range from Queensland down to Victoria so here the two species overlap.

The purple-crowned lorikeet usually feeds at the top of trees and has a distinctive high pitched tsit tsit call when flying. They are green on the back, have a pale blue belly and can be identified by their purple crown and yellow patch on their cheek. The little lorikeet is mostly green but their distinguishing feature is their red marking above and below their beak. Their call is also high pitched but without the 'buzz' of the purple crowned lorikeet.

Lorikeets have brush tongues which have elongated papillae or hooks which enable them to collect pollen and nectar from eucalypts Although they are mostly seen on flowering eucalypts they also feed on fruit and insects and visit other flowering plants.

Lorikeets in our area nest in the spring with a nest in tree hollows, mostly in gum trees, so the many birds actively feeding at the moment are probably feeding their young as well. If you check out some of the lorikeets in the flowering gums you may be able to work out which species are there.

Avoid fire risks when decorating for Christmas

As Victorians once again unbox their Christmas tree and untangle decorations, fire authorities are encouraging everyone to take steps to avoid Santa's naughty list and stay safe this festive season. Fire Rescue Victoria and CFA are urging Victorians to celebrate this festive season safely by checking Christmas lights before switching them on.

Damaged or faulty lights, combined with tinsel and plastic decorations can significantly increase the risk of fire in the home.

Last December, firefighters were called to a house fire in Glen Waverley after Christmas decorations sparked a blaze that destroyed a family of four's home.

Father, George, was home with his two children when his smoke alarm went off alerting him to his Christmas tree on fire.

George tried to put the fire out himself but the blaze spread too quickly, leaving him only moments to flee with his daughters.

Stark reminder

Incident Controller FRV Commander Julian Bisbal said it's a stark reminder to check lights are in good working order before decorating trees and homes.

"Inspect lights for missing bulbs and frayed cords, and make sure you turn lights off when not in the room," he said.

"It's also an important reminder to never delay calling Triple Zero (000). When it comes to fire, minutes matter. The sooner you call Triple Zero (000), the sooner firefighters can help."

The past financial year, FRV and CFA responded to numerous fires caused by Christmas decorations.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said it's also important to not overload powerboards and to avoid using double adaptors.

"Taking a few minutes to ensure everything is safe could save your home and those you love," he said.

"Christmas should be a time for

celebration and doing things like untangling cords, not running them under mats or rugs, and turning lights off before you go to sleep can ensure it stays a happy time and not a catastrophic one."

Safety list

See FRV and CFA's safety list, and remember to check it twice:

- Check Christmas lights meet Australian Safety Standards
- Inspect Christmas lights for damage and signs of wear and tear
- Don't use light sets with exposed wiring or missing bulbs
- Never overload power boards, and avoid using double adaptors

- Untangle electrical cords and check they're not under rugs or mats
- If decorating the outside of your home, choose lights and fittings for external use
- Check you have a safety switch in your meter box, or have a qualified electrician install one
- Place your tree as far as possible from any heat source, curtains or furnishings.
- Maintain water in the base of natural Christmas trees to stop them drying out and remove lights once they show signs of drying
- Have working smoke alarms in all bedrooms, living areas and hallways

Festive season struggles

A new survey commissioned by the St Vincent de Paul Society reveals that cost-of-living pressures are threatening to turn the festive season into a time of stress rather than celebration, with more than half (53 percent) of Victorians feeling financial stress leading into Christmas.

Across the country, 62 percent of Australians say that cost-of-living pressures are making it difficult to plan or think about festive season celebrations. Alarmingly, almost half (49 percent) of Australian families with children under 18 were concerned about just being able to put food on the table this Christmas.

The findings come as the St Vincent de Paul Society launches its annual Vinnies Christmas Appeal, calling on Australians to help bring hope, comfort and dignity to families facing a difficult Christmas.

In Victoria, the situation reflects the national trend, with more than a third (37 percent) of households worried about providing food this Christmas.

Dr Jennifer Fitzgerald AM, Group CEO St Vincent de Paul Society Victoria said, "As we approach the Christmas season, more and more families across Victoria are feeling the impact of the ongoing cost-of-living crisis, struggling to cover essentials like food, rent and utilities. What should be a time of celebration has

become a time of real hardship for many."

But it's not only Christmastime when people are hurting; almost one in three (32 percent) Australians admit they've skipped meals or gone without food in the past 12 months to afford other essentials, such as rent or electricity.

"Sadly, this survey confirms what our members, volunteers and employees are seeing every day. Over the past year, we've witnessed a staggering increase in requests for support, with families who have never asked for help before are suddenly finding themselves stretched to the limit and needing the basics just to get by." Dr Fitzgerald said.

"This year, we're calling on Victorians who can afford it, to donate to the Vinnies Christmas Appeal and help us provide nutritious meals, and vital assistance to local families who need a helping hand this Christmas."

"Every dollar raised will help vulnerable Victorians find hope and relief during what should be the happiest time of the year. Your generosity could be your greatest gift this Christmas." Dr Fitzgerald said.

GOOD LIFE

The Chain That Held Together

A friend gave me an old chain the other day. He'd found it while helping a retired farmer clean up a shed. Nothing special at first glance; just a length of rusted iron, but when I laid it out, I saw it told a story.

At one end, a heavy S-hook, hand-forged by a blacksmith generations ago. From there, the chain turns unexpectedly modern; smooth oval links, machine-made and welded by the roll. Midway along, a split repair link joins it to something older: a section of handwrought chain, each link slightly misshapen and narrowed in the middle, hammered and fire-welded. Three sections. Three eras. One working life.

Someone, somewhere, had chosen to fix it rather than throw it away. When part of it wore thin, they added something new. When another broke, they found a way to keep it useful. It's the sort of quiet ingenuity that has kept farms and families going for generations; always mending, adapting, keeping things connected.

That chain has stayed on my mind because it captures something bigger about life, faith and the stories we inherit. Around here, there are farms with names on the mailbox that go back a century or more. Families where one generation hands on the next season of work to another, sometimes smoothly, sometimes painfully.

Succession planning, whether on the farm or in business, is rarely straightforward. One generation wants to hand on a legacy; the next wants to make it their own. Somewhere between those desires lies the art of joining new links to old without breaking what holds them together. This is the art of renewal.

Our church cluster has been asking similar questions as we work through our five-year plan. How do small congregations with long histories find a sustainable future? How do we make sure we're adding new links, not just polishing the old ones?

The story of that chain, and perhaps the story of Christmas too, offers a clue.

There's a moment in the Bible when God looks at a world gone wrong and decides to start again. The story of Noah's Ark is in some ways, the story of throwing it all away and beginning anew. It's a mixture of judgment, mercy and grief: mercy tinged with sorrow, a heartbreaking restart. God lets the waters wash away what's broken, yet shelters a

remnant, refusing to give up on creation.

But the story doesn't end there. By the time we reach Christmas, we see a different approach. This time God doesn't destroy and rebuild; he enters and redeems. Instead of throwing away the old world he joins himself to it: flesh, bone and rust. The incarnation is repair work of the most extraordinary kind.

And that I think, is the difference between human impatience and divine love. We're often tempted to start over; a new plan, a new property, a new life. But God keeps finding ways to mend what's already here. To reconnect the broken links, to add grace where wear and tear have done their worst.

When Paul wrote to Timothy, he reminded him of the faith that first lived in his grandmother Lois and in his mother Eunice, "and now lives in you also.", (2 Timothy 1: 1-14) That's a chain of faith, link to link, generation to generation. It's not perfect. Some parts may be rusty or repaired, but it still holds.

Christmas, at heart, is about continuity; the joining of heaven and earth, past and future, human and divine. The genealogy in Matthew's Gospel is like a long chain itself, each name another link in God's promise, stretching through the centuries to a manger in Bethlehem.

When I look at that old chain now hanging in my shed, I see a kind of gospel truth written in iron. The blacksmith's hook, the machine-made section, the

old handmade links; each one necessary, each one carrying the marks of its time. It's not polished or perfect, but it's strong because it's been mended.

That's the image I hold onto as we plan for the next season; for our farms, our families, our churches. We don't need to throw everything out and start from scratch. We just need to find where the break is, add a new link, and keep the chain useful.

Maybe the good life isn't about everything being new. Maybe it's about keeping faith with what's already been given and being brave enough to add something of our own.




